# What's going on regarding birth defects

Themed Issue on Birth Defects Registry Methods, Spring 2014, Journal of Registry Management. The National Birth Defects Prevention Network (NBDPN) is continuing its arrangement with the Journal of Registry Management (JRM) to provide a themed issue on birth defects surveillance, with papers focusing on birth defects program methods, approaches to assuring/evaluating data quality and completeness, and innovative approaches to improving the science and practice of birth defects surveillance. The **National Registry of Congenital Anomalies in Argentina, RENAC** published an article on the characteristics and operation of the registry and on the prevalence of 56 specific anomalies. A study based on data from **Texas Birth Defects Registry** showed that greater distance from birth center to cardiac surgery center was associated with increased neonatal mortality of infants with hypoplastic left heart syndrome (HLHS), with most of this mortality being pre-surgical. Efforts to improve prenatal diagnosis of HLHS and subsequent delivery near a large volume CSC may significantly improve outcome of infants with HLHS. Reference: Shaine A. Morris, Mary K. The **Northern Netherlands** program recently published a study in the European Journal of Epidemiology in which they report on **an increased risk of oral clefts**, in particular cleft lip/alveolus, in association with **periconceptional folic acid use**. In this study data from both the birth defects registry and the national clefts register were combined and classified according to the standard classification and according to timing and underlying developmental mechanisms.
