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## **What's Going on Regarding Birth Defects**

- World Birth Defects Day (WBDD) March 3, 2016 is a few weeks away. It is through our collective voices that we will raise

- **Zika virus infection during pregnancy**: look at the dedicated page on the ICBDSR website <a href="www.icbdsr.org">www.icbdsr.org</a>, created for gathering and making available the official information regarding particularly microcephaly with or without neurological or other organ anomalies and its possible association with the Zika virus infection.
- **29 February 2016** marks the ninth international **Rare Disease Day** coordinated by EURORDIS. On and around this day hundreds of patient organizations from countries and regions all over the world will hold awareness-raising activities based on the slogan "Join us in making the voice of rare diseases heard". - This month's CDC Vital Signs (<a href="http://www.cdc.gov/vitalsigns/">http://www.cdc.gov/vitalsigns/</a>) presents information on the risk of alcohol exposure during pregnancy among U.S. women. Vital Signs is a CDC report that appears on the first Tuesday of the month. It includes a Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report (MMWR) Early Release, a graphic fact sheet and website, a media release, and social media tools. Most of the materials are available in English and Spanish. Alcohol use during pregnancy can cause fetal alcohol spectrum disorders (FASDs), which are physical, behavioral, and intellectual disabilities that last a lifetime. It is recommended that women who are pregnant or might be pregnant not drink alcohol at all. FASDs do not occur if a developing baby is not exposed to alcohol before birth. Main Findings:
  - √ 3.3 million U.S. women are at risk of exposing their developing baby to alcohol (also known as an alcohol-exposed pregnancy). This is because they are drinking, sexually active, and not using birth control to prevent pregnancy.
  - ✓ 3 in 4 women who want to get pregnant as soon as possible report drinking alcohol.

    Data from the report come from CDC's 2011-2013 National Survey of Family Growth, which gathers information on family life, marriage, divorce, pregnancy, infertility, use of contraception, and men's and women's health. National estimates of alcohol-exposed pregnancy were calculated among non-pregnant, non-sterile women aged 15–44 years. Women and their healthcare providers can work together to prevent alcohol use during pregnancy.
