Digital Press Kit from CDC - Zika Virus: Protecting Pregnant Women and Babies

About 1 in 10 U.S. pregnant women with confirmed Zika had a fetus or baby with birth defects in 2016. Nearly 1,300 pregnant women with evidence of possible Zika infection were reported in 44 US states in 2016. Of these, almost 1,000 pregnancies were completed by the end of the year and more than 50 of those babies had Zikarelated birth defects, according to a new **Vital Signs report** from the **Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).** Full information available at https://www.cdc.gov/vitalsigns/

A recent paper published on JAMA Pediatrics by the Global Burden of Disease Child and Adolescent Health Collaboration, quantifies and describes levels and trends of mortality and nonfatal health outcomes among children and adolescents from 1990 to 2015 to provide a framework for policy discussion. Comprehensive and timely monitoring of disease burden in all age groups, including children and adolescents, is essential for improving population health.
