What's Going on Regarding Birth Defects

A study assessing causation and clinical presentation of major birth defects was carried out using data from Utah's population based surveillance system, on children born 2005-09 to resident women. The findings underscore the gaps in our knowledge regarding the causes of birth defects. For the causes that are still unknown (79%) better strategies are needed. These can include greater integration of the key elements of etiology, morphology, and pathogenesis into epidemiologic studies; and greater collaboration between researchers, clinicians, and epidemiologists; also better ways to objectively measure fetal exposures are needed.

Results from a population based cohort study on Risk of major congenital malformations in relation to maternal overweight and obesity severity have been published in the British Medical Journal. The objective of the study is To estimate the risks of major congenital malformations in the offspring of mothers who are underweight (body mass index (BMI) <18.5), overweight (BMI 25 to <30), or in obesity classes I (BMI 30 to <35), II (35 to <40), or III (≥40) compared with offspring of normal weight mothers (BMI 18.5 to <25) in early pregnancy.
